





25 and 26 October, 20:00 Living Dance Studio: RED

Concept, direction and choreography: Wen Hui Tickets: 290 CZK / 150 CZK students, seniors / #studovna 50 CZK / 80 min

The performance combines dance and documentary film with the real stories of Chinese dancers. In order to devote themselves to dance and escape expulsion from the countryside, they had to perform in the propaganda ballet Red Women's Battalion, which served the Chinese regime as an instrument of ideological struggle. The memory of the human body still produces powerful images today. Based on technically perfect movement patterns, the outstanding dancers and performers bring to life their memories of the state indoctrination of dance art and reveal how the Cultural Revolution still affects Chinese society today. Each performance is followed by a discussion with the artists.

27 and 29 October, 20:00 **Ordinary people**

A meeting of Czech and Chinese stories on one stage. Tales of desire, of cruelty, of joy, of blood, of unhealed traumas, of love and of death are narrated in parallel by various theatrical means. Music, dance, video art and light design are created by Czech and Chinese artists together directly in front of the viewers' eyes in a constantly changing scene. Apparently business with China is more important for ordinary people than human rights. That's what politicians say. What is it like when Czechs and Chinese tell their "ordinary" stories? Each performance is followed by a discussion with the artists.

A performance based on playing with media and a combination of various theatrical approaches. Personal testimonies, video art, choreography, music, and a changing scene are a playground for three performers and one commentator. The theme of the performance is determined by the question: How do young Russians living in the Czech Republic cope with the Czech historical complex caused by the invasion of August 1968? The stage is a space where memory can be recovered, relativizing stereotypes, destroying clichés, and disrupting patterns.


The visual performance Fatherland combines elements of video installation, documentary and theatre. Director Jan Mocek based it on intimate and multilayered situations: he meets on the stage with this 34 years older father Jan Mocek. The same name and remarkable physical similarity of both men is an impulse to play with the theme of identity, in which the presence of the father transforms into the future of the son. Besides the personal, documentary level, the performance also contains a political dimension. The subject of masculinity is examined in a male family against the background of the disintegration and re-inventing of our Czech individual and collective identity.



24 November, 18:00 and 25 November, 13:00 **Milo Rau: Five easy peaces**

Is it possible – and with which means – to perform the life of child killer Marc Dutroux with children? Swiss theatre director Milo Rau and his International Institute of Political Murder (IIPM) have conquered the biggest international stages in recent years with their matchless political theatre. Their works are based on testimonies and reconstructions of true stories and mercilessly break through the taboos of our age. Together with the CAMPO arts centre from Ghent, they have set up an ambitious project involving children and teenagers between 8 and 13 years old. Rau uses the biography of the country's most notoriously shameful criminal to sketch a brief history of Belgium and to reflect on the [re]presentation of human feelings on stage.





29 November and 2 December 2018, 20:00 **Dream of Modernity**

The "scientific theatre" format gives scientific debate a stage shape. The Archa Theatre returns to this form of theatre expression for the first time since Misunderstanding 68 was presented 10 years ago. 1918 – Dream of Modernity offers the viewer a spectrum of emotional and sensory experiences embedded in the dialogue of the philosopher and writer Pieter de Buysser and the literary scientist Martin C. Putna. The viewer enters a space installation in which he travels back and forth through the centuries and asks questions about the future of the territory called Europe. Part of the performance is an open debate with experts and viewers.

30 November 2018, 20:00 11:55 - The Truth About 17/11

The group of young artists 11:55 [read: five to twelve] has decided to open up a topic that has seemingly been resolved in Czech society, and thus to conclude the pulp trilogy which has been created over the years under the directorial guidance of Petra Tejnorová. Pulp no longer needs to be searched for in cheap brochures – we feel like we are living in it. It comes to us from our newspapers, magazines and screens, and our smartphones. People, tired of the complicated rigmarole of the post-Soviet development of our country, are once again looking for a simpler, more comprehensible world that does not ask questions. The young artists decided to start asking before we wake up one day and receive the answers readymade. They decided to become their own correspondents for the future.

How we loved the revolution! But it turned its back on the children of Karl Marx and Coca-Cola and spoke to the new generation. Bini Adamczak writes: "1917 was about issues of state, while 1968 focused on the individual. The future must focus on how human beings relate to one another." There is one anniversary after another – 50 years since 1968, a hundred years since the October Revolution, two hundred years since the birth of Karl Marx – and four women (well-known German actresses) embark on a random journey: travelling around this strange old continent and looking for love....

A meeting with the authors and protagonists of RED Dancers Liu Zhuying and Wen Hui were born in the 1960s at the time of the Great Chinese Famine. They grew up during the Cultural Revolution. As children they underwent very difficult training in ballet school, which was meant to prepare them for the propaganda ballet Red Women's Battalion, the flagship of Communist China under Mao Zedong. Dancers Li Yuyao and LI Xinmin were born in the 1980s. Today they are around 30 years old. In a meeting with the artists we will ask: What can one overcome to save one's own life? Where do the limits of human freedom lie?



19. November 2018 Documentary Theatre Workshop for Teachers
