#### The Sound of Sacred Space: Between Theology, Liturgy and Art

in lecture room P8 at 4.00 p.m.

#### Abstract of the Lecture:

In the history of religions, the use of music and song in worship is constant as a vehicle of relationship between the human being and the divinity. Too often the study of the sacred takes only three dimensions that characterize it: the tremendum, the fascinans and sometimes the obscurum. I propose to add, to these three, an important category: the sonorum. In this paper I would like to present how this identification between worship-space and art, marked by the song of the word, can be analysed anthropologically, artistically, and theologically.

**Prof. Dr. D. Jordi-Agustí Piqué i Collado OSB**, born 1963 in Mollerussa, Spain, is the Dean of the Pontifcio Istituto Liturgico in Rome, as well as a well-regarded musician, composer, and theoretician of the liturgic music. A Benedictine monk of Montserrat since 1990, he was an organist at the Basilica of Montserrat. In 1997 he became Maestro of the Capella and director of the Escalonia de Montserrat. As the director of church music at Montserrat he authored several liturgical compositions for Escolania de Montserrat. He has held concerts with this group in many European countries.
